## **Tree/Shrub Descriptions**

Apple, Honeycrisp: Grows well in cooler climates. Crisp, sweet late September apples store well. H:10'-12', W: 10'-12'.

**Cherry, Sweet Cherry Pie:** Self-pollinating compact tree. Sweetest of the "sour" cherries, they are great for jams, jellies and pies. Tree blooms in early May and fruits ripen in mid-July. H: 15', W: 12".

**Chokeberry, Aronia Glossy Black:** Upright, spreading, deciduous shrub that typically grows 3-6' tall. It is native to low woods, swamps, bogs and moist thickets but occasionally to dry upland areas. Has 5-6 flowered clusters of white 5-petaled spring flowers, glossy green leaves, black autumn berries (blueberry size) and purple/red fall color. Fruits are sometimes used to make jams and jellies. A favorite of birds.

Coneflower, Purple: Native perennial that grows 2-4' tall. Prefers full sun. Favorite of bees and butterflies.

**Crabapple, Prairiefire:** Deep pink blooms attract bees and butterflies in the spring and lead to small red fruits that are a favorite of wildlife in the fall. Disease resistant tree. H:15-20' W:10-15'.

**Dogwood, Red Osier:** Medium growing shrub with cream-colored flowers in spring and white to bluish berries in late summer. Brilliant red twigs in winter. H: 5-6', W: 5-6'.

**Hazelnut, American:** Also known as a filbert. Fast growing tree-like shrub. Bright red blooms in the spring. Prefers full sun and well drained soil. Needs 3-5 plants for pollination for nut production. H: 10-15' W:8-15'.

**Maple, Brandywine:** Fast growing shade tree whose leaves turn fiery red in the fall. Grows well in medium to wet well drained soils in full sun to part shade. Disease and insect resistant and don't produce seeds like other maples. H: 30', W: 20'.

**Norway Spruce**: Non-native, large fast-growing tree reaching 100' tall and 30' in diameter. Dark green branches with short stiff needles have a distinctive drooping appearance.

**Oak, Bur**: Slow growing, long lived, rounded tree. Large leaves that turn golden yellow in the fall. Large acorns are a favorite of many animals. H: 70-80', W: 80'

**Oak, Red:** fast growing, long lived native shade tree. Adaptable to extremes of soil, but prefers acid, well-drained sites. High wildlife value. The fall color is bronze-red to bright red. H: 50'-75', W: 40'-50'.

**Oak, Swamp White:** Large native tree that will tolerate both wetland and upland sites but prefers moist soils. Fall color is usually a yellow/brown but can be reddish. High wildlife value. H: 50'-60', W: 50'-60'.

**Oak, White:** A large, stately, classic oak tree. The state tree of Illinois. Grows best in deep, moist, acid, well-drained soil, but is adaptable. Beautiful fall colors from a light red to deep red color. One of the highest-ranking trees in wildlife value. H: 50'-100', W: 40'-50'.

**Plum, American:** Small medium-growing tree with showy, white flowers and reddish-purple fruits. It prefers full to partial sun and well-drained soils. It attracts birds and other pollinators. The leaves will turn an amber or reddish color in the fall. H: 10-20', W: 15-25'.

**Prairie Dropseed grass**: Clump-forming, warm season, native perennial grass which typically occurs in prairies throughout much of the State. Easily grown in average, dry to medium, well-drained soils in full sun. Good drought tolerance. Slow-growing and slow to establish. Typically forms an arching foliage mound to 15" tall and 18" wide. Foliage turns golden with orange hues in fall, fading to light bronze in winter.

**Serviceberry, Shadblow**: Native shrub that develops pink buds in the spring that turn into white blossoms. Fruit ripens in autumn which is edible and can be eaten raw or cooked. A favorite of wildlife. Leaves turn reddish orange in the fall. H: 10-25' W: 10-25'.

**Viburnum, Nannyberry:** Fast growing excellent native shrub for wildlife, with white flowers in the spring that attract pollinators and dark blue fruits that ripen in the fall and may be used in jams and jellies. The smoothedged leaves turn a lovely red orange in the fall. H: 6-10', W: 6-10'.

**White Pine**: Native, fast-growing evergreen tree can get 90'-120' tall and 30' in diameter. Soft long needles. Deer browse can be an issue, therefore young trees may need protection.
